Prior Knowledge

In EYFS, the children have discussed features of their local environment and created simple maps to show a familiar area. They have created models of cities using construction toys and looked at similarities and differences between their houses.

In Year 1, the children have learned about where our school is. They have found out about our village and planned routes around it and to other places in the local area. In Maths, they have learned about position and direction, using key vocabulary to describe these. They have used maps, atlases and globes to find where we live in the world.

Lesson 4: I can identify features of Northern Ireland and its capital city. I can discuss how the Union Jack is made up.


