# LITTLE WOODLANDS

NEWS FROM THE NURSERY



This week we have been looking at farm machinery as our “Marvellous Machines” topic continues. During circle time discussions we talked about the history of farming and looked at photographs of how farming has changed over the years, with the development of machinery. We thought it was very funny that cows used to be milked by hand into a pail with the “milk maid” sitting under the cow on a stool! Now cows go into a milking parlour and are milked by a very large machine. The fields were ploughed by gangs of people working horses or even donkeys! Today the job is done using enormous tractors and ploughs. Rebekah told us how some farmers use special machines to create hay ricks which we see this time of year in fields around Winkleigh. This is an ancient way of stacking hay, corn, straw, or similar material. The hay is thatched on the top to keep it dry. This method of hay making means that every part of the hay can be used as feed for the animals and thatch to make roofs for local houses. We were lucky enough to be visited by two tractors this week. A huge thank you to Albie’s Grandad who drove his tractor to school to show us exactly how big they are! The children were very excited.

Throughout the week we dodged the showers to enjoy playing with messy materials in our garden. We have loved playing with gloop and shaving foam and generally getting as messy as possible in the sunshine! We have had lots of fun.

Next week we will be practicing for sports day on Monday, in readiness for our Sports Day slot on Tuesday morning. All children are invited to race. We need to be down on the school field promptly for a 9.00 am start where will compete in running races and sports activities for 30minutes. All children are invited to attend regardless of whether your child is in session on a Tuesday. Please drop them to the pod by 8.45am at the latest, wearing running shoes if you would like your child to take part.

Our family trip to The Big Sheep is on Wednesday. (Nursery will be closed that day). We will meet you there at 10.00 am. We are keeping our fingers crossed for fine weather so we can enjoy a picnic lunch with you all.

## Year 1—Mrs Rowcliffe & Mrs Keast

Year One have worked really hard this week on their quizzes and we are very proud of them. At the end of the week we spent some time in our English lessons working on correcting sentences so that they have the correct punctuation. We also used some adjectives to describe The Highway Rat. In Maths we have looked closely at the hundred square and discussed the patterns we can spot within the numbers.

In History we learned about Grace Darling and her famous involvement in the rescue of the shipwrecked Forfarshire in 1838. We drew our own portrait of Grace in the style of the 'Little People, Big Dreams' books which we are very fond of!

In PSHE we have been thinking about teasing and bullying. We talked about the differences between these two definition. We then thought about who can help us if we have a problem with these issues and how to ensure that we are listened to. The children drew some lovely pictures and had a thoughtful discussion about how we can help resolve problems if they arise.

## Year 2—Miss Jones



Another week has flown by. We consolidated our learning about turns to make a sequence showing quarter and half turns clockwise and anti-clockwise. We worked alongside our partners to make sequences and then used key vocabulary to describe the pattern. We have moved onto time in Maths and have recapped telling the time to the nearest hour as well as recognising quarter past, quarter to and half past. We also applied our knowledge of counting in 5s to tell the time to the nearest 5 minutes. We have begun exploring poetry in English after completing our independent write earlier in the week.

There were some fantastic poems written by the children for their elicitation task including some similes! We recognised repetition and rhyme in some different nature poems. On Friday we worked collaboratively to perform a poem to the class and offered each other constructive feedback.



In History we looked at what happened during WWII and learned about rationing. We couldn't believe some of the foods that we wouldn't have been able to eat at the time! In Science we looked at the basic needs of living things and considered how we meet the needs of our own pets.

## Year 3—Mr Slocombe

What an exciting week in Year 3! We have finished our independent writing about the Paperbag Prince in English this week. The children innovated their own characters and settings and described what took place on the unusual day! We have begun our new sequence around Paint me a poem, sharing our likes and dislikes about a piece of artwork before turning it into a poem.

We had fun in maths on Tuesday when we put our mass and capacity skills to the test and made our own Rocky Road. We also compared the mass of various objects that were wrapped up and had to guess which might be the heaviest before weighing them.

In science, we have considered the dangers of the sun's UV light and thought about ways that we can protect ourselves. We have designed our drinks in D&T this week and will be making them next week.

In PE, we have been preparing for sports day and are very excited about that on Tuesday! We have ended the week with our very exciting camping trip – pictures on page 8!

## Year 4—Miss McLean

Another busy week has passed in Year Four this week. Despite unfortunately not being able to visit QE as planned today, we still had a great morning practicing our bowling, batting and fielding skills before playing some rounders games.

We spent lots of time in English this week recapping how to form and use complex sentences. **Can you remember what a complex sentence is?** We took facts from the Book of Bones to help us write some of our own facts. We have come to the end of our maths sequence on time by converting time from analogue clocks to 12- and 24-hour digital clocks and learning strategies to help us remember how many days there are in each month of the year. Next week, we will start our next sequence on shape.

On Tuesday, we learnt that the Anglo-Saxons were pagans and believed in many gods. We then used our iPads to research and make fact files about the Gods. In Science, we learnt about the structure of teeth and looked at what happens when teeth are not looked after properly. In RE, we discuss what Bar/Bat Mitzvah means to Jewish people and spoke about what it means to become an adult to us. Have a lovely weekend all!

## Year 5—Mr Walter

Year 5 have had a fantastic week. We have started sequence based on the adventurous writing of J.R.R Tolkien in the Hobbit. The children have discussed their understanding of a hero and if Bilbo Baggins is going to be one. Additionally through role-play and the re-writing of a scene, we have been able to explore the key vocabulary from the text.



In maths, we have had a focus on the meanings of the prefixes 'milli' and 'kilo' exploring how to convert between different units of metric measurement. This has resulted us to look into multi-step word problems that require us to consolidate our prior understanding of the four operations and place value.



In DT, we have been planning and designing advertising pitches (keep your eye out) for our final project at the end of term. In science we explored the ways gears work and the differences in bicycle gears when riding up and downhill.



Finally, everyone worked together to make a peace tree in RE, we debated what the meaning of peace meant and spoke about who we saw as a peacemaker in our lives. We then shared our thoughts and feelings by creating our own tree to show our strategies to implement peace.




## Year 6—Mr Davis

We have had more of a normal week in Year 6 this week. In English, we have been looking at the fictional world of Pandora. The children have been learning how this biome was created for the film Avatar by biologists and anthropologists in order to make it seem plausible. They have created a non-chronological report detailing their findings. In Maths, year 6 have been applying their skills to a variety of problem solving games including a horse race, a time ordering challenge and the mystery of palindromes.

In History, we have looked at another legacy of the Ancient Greeks - philosophy. The children learned the basics of Socrates and his student, Plato. We then took part in a though experiment to decide whether or not we would adjust the path of a runaway train. The children asked some fascinating questions and, eventually, we made a decision as a class.

In Art this week, Year 6 have been learning how to draw 3D objects using a vanishing point to change the perspective of the viewer. Finally, in PE, Year 6 have been preparing to help run Sports Day on Tuesday. We are all looking forward to an amazing day. Have a lovely weekend.
