


The Tudors


Lesson 6: How did punishment work in Tudor times?

A study over time tracing how several aspects of national history are reflected in the locality (this can go beyond 1066) – (Map work – comparing Tudor maps of towns locally to modern OS maps). Understanding the changing power of monarchs using case studies (Henry VIII).

To study a period of British history that extends my chronology beyond 1066.
